For more than 15 years, CHANGE has advocated for the sexual and reproductive health and rights of women and girls worldwide through U.S. foreign policy.


Since its founding in 1994, CHANGE has:

- Advocated for increased funding of voluntary family planning programs and services
- Exposed the detrimental effects of funding restrictions through face-to-face meetings between policy makers and women from Africa, Latin America and Asia
- Trained and mobilized U.S. grassroots leaders to be a voice for change in U.S. foreign policy debates that affect sexual and reproductive health and rights.

CHANGE believes that every individual has a human right to the basic information, technologies, and services needed to enjoy a healthy and safe sexual and reproductive life free from coercion and preventable illness. We hold the U.S. government accountable for upholding that right in all its foreign policies.



CHANGE envisions a world where sexual and reproductive health and rights are universally recognized and sexual and reproductive health care is accessible and available to all.



The U.S. government's ability to stem global health epidemics hinges on confronting the gender inequalities that threaten the health and rights of women and girls. CHANGE advocates for a foreign policy that is woman-centered, human-rights-based, integrated, and above all, proven to positively impact the basic human rights and wellbeing of women and girls worldwide.

As a part of our efforts, we present policy makers with evidence-based research about the negative impacts of problematic policies, and case studies of effective, rights-based

approaches. We expose contradictions and gaps in policy and funding levels, and spark direct interaction between policy makers and those most affected by U.S. foreign policy on sexual and reproductive health—women.
